

HE WEST HAS LONG BEEN ASSOCIATED WITH bravery and pioneer spirit, with heading into the unknown to make a better life. As Montana writer William Kittredge described, "They did the endless work, they took care, they were the people who invented our civilization, theirs was a tradition of civility."

These principles became codes of conduct that many of our cowboy heroes of the past promoted and illustrated for us. Maybe it's the times or the rapid globalization of society, but it's difficult to see how we all wouldn't be better off if we simply followed and practiced some of these simple rules of polite deportment. Maybe it's just because we forgot some of them. But we shouldn't. The world would be a much friendlier place if we all acted, say, a little bit more like a Roy Rogers or a Gene Autry. So what follows, saddle pals, is a reminder of cowboy codes, prayers, creeds, and rules from some of our favorite cowboy heroes. Use them and pass them along. We can all stand to be a little more cowboy. And that is a good thing.
